Have a Clear:

Beginning (Introduction)

Middle (Story, Impact)

End (Results, What's Next)

is it emphasized?

What are the direct and/or
indirect links to community
and business development?

- Share a headline suggestion
- Provide your name and title
- What is the workforce development project that is related to your story?
- When did the project begin? How did it come about?
- What workforce gap is it trying to solve? What have you heard from industry?
- When will the project conclude, or is it ongoing?
- What is the source of funding for this project?
- Describe the community the project is serving. Is it rural or underserved? Is it youth, adult learners, or another focused demographic?
- Where did this story take place? City or town, college, community organization, business, etc.
- What is the focus of your story? This could be about participation, results, individuals, collaboration... anything tied to why the project exists.
- Who contributed or walked alongside as this story unfolded?
- Were there any surprises or unexpected results that occurred?
- Why is it important for people to hear this story?
- How do you want people to feel when you tell this story?
- Is there an action that you want people to take after they have read this story?
- Consider providing quotations from people related to the project including System colleagues and program staff.
